

Islington is one of the most built up boroughs in London, however 25% of Islington's landscape is made up of private gardens. It's important to recognise the opportunity these spaces provide for wildlife, no matter how small, and the role we play in protecting them.

Wildlife in Islington?

When we talk about wildlife in Islington, many people might say what wildlife? You may be surprised to learn there is an abundance of wildlife living on our doorstep; you sometimes just need to take a closer look. Can you imagine finding Pyramidal and Bee Orchids in the Borough? They're here and much more besides!

Why the Wildlife Gardening Pack?

The Pack is just one part of a much wider initiative addressing the whole issue of biodiversity within the Borough, its health, enhancement and long term sustainability.

What is Biodiversity?

Biodiversity is the word used to describe the abundance of life on earth; it covers the whole range of living things; animals and birds, trees and flowers, insects and fungi. It is not just about the rare and the threatened, just as important is the wildlife we see and experience every day, from the robin on our bird-table to the dandelions in our lawns.

Following the Rio Earth Summit in 1992, the UK was one of the first countries to sign up to the Convention on Biological Diversity, which led to the production of the UK Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP). In 2001 The London BAP was produced by a consortium of partners including local government agencies, the Greater London Authority, NGO's (RSPB, London Wildlife Trust), and private landowners (Peabody Trust, and Thames Water).

As a result of the above Islington produced its very own Biodiversity Action Plan, to protect conserve and enhance the Boroughs wildlife. Gardens were identified as being very important to the Borough and were given there own Habitat Action Plan which also included allotments. Key Actions:

Some of the key actions in the Gardens and Allotments Habitat Action Plan are as follows:

- Carry out a public survey of garden wildlife.
- Produce literature on wildlife friendly gardening.
- Establish a demonstration wildlife garden at the Islington Ecology Centre.
- To seek to limit the loss of gardens through development.
- Hold a series of wildlife gardening events and establish a group of wildlife gardening experts.

Wildlife gardening in Islington

There are a number of projects that are taking place in the Borough and local groups / organisations that you can get involved in.

Islington in Bloom

This is an annual competition run in the Borough and is a chance to show off your garden and help make Islington a greener, cleaner and brighter place: there are awards for Best Wildlife-Friendly gardens in each category. Entries that are successful are put forward into the London in Bloom competition. The criteria for entries, is for any blooms that can be seen from the highway.
